

EXOTIC AQUATIC PLANTS:

Exotic aquatic plants are a growing problem in lakes, ponds, rivers, and streams in New Jersey. These exotic intruders are choking out native plants and animals, inhibiting recreation areas, creating mosquito larva habitat, and clogging ditches and irrigation channels.

Did you know that:

Many warmer climate invasive plants are expanding their range and have adapted to cooler areas?

Plants can escape from your pond even if there is no direct aquatic connection to natural waters? The seeds are spread and plant roots and fragments are carried by birds or animals.

HOW YOU CAN HELP:

This brochure presents attractive alternatives to ornamental pond plants that cause problems in waterways.

It is also vital to follow safe gardening practices:

- Build your water garden away from natural waterways.
- Plant non-invasive alternatives.
- Place plants in containers to reduce the likelihood that they will spread. This also simplifies pond maintenance.
- Dispose of unwanted pond plants by composting (if applied far from surface water) or drying thoroughly and placing in plastic bags in a trash container.

THE LEAST WANTED: ALIEN INVASIVE PLANTS

Eichornia crassipes -water hyacinth

Hydrilla verticillata - Florida elodea, hydrilla, or water thyme

Iris pseudacorus - yellow flag iris

Ludwigia peploides - floating primrose willow

Lythrum salicaria - purple loosestrife

Marsilea quadrifolia - European water clover

Myriophyllum aquaticum - parrotfeather milfoil

Myriophyllum spicatum -Eurasian milfoil

Pistia stratooides -water lettuce

Rorippa nasturtium-aquaticum - white watercress

Trapa natans - water chestnut



NATIVE PLANTS FOR OUTDOOR PONDS - PLANT THESE INSTEAD

OXYGENATING PLANTS:

Ceratophyllum demersum - coontail

TRUE AQUATICS (WITH STANDING WATER ABOVE CROWN, SUN):

Nymphaea odorata - white water lily

Nuphar lutea - yellow pond lily, spatterdock

EMERGENTS - (VERY SHALLOW WATER OR MUCK SOIL, SUN)

Caltha palustris - marsh marigold

Equisetum hyemale - scouringrush horsetail

Iris versicolor - blue flag

Iris prismatica - slender blue iris

Leersia oryzoides - rice cutgrass

Mimulus ringens - Allegheny monkeyflower

Orontium aquaticum - goldenclub; neverwet

Polygonum amphibium - water knotweed

Pontederia cordata - pickerelweed

Sagittaria latifolia - broadleaf arrowhead

Saururus cernuus - lizard tail

Typha angustifolia - narrowleaf cattail, *T. latifolia* - broadleaf cattail



MARSH PLANTS (SHALLOW WATER, SUN)/ WET MEADOW (SATURATED SOIL, SUN):

Asclepias incarnata - swamp milkweed
Chelone glabra - white turtlehead
Decodon verticillatus - swamp loosestrife
Eupatorium dubium, E. purpureum - Joe pyeweed
Eupatorium perfoliatum - common boneset
Helianthus angustifolius - swamp sunflower
Helenium autumnale - common sneezeweed
Hibiscus moscheutos - rosemallow
Impatiens capensis, I. pallida - touch-me-knot, jewelweed
Kosteletzky virginica - saltmarsh mallow
Lobelia cardinalis, - cardinal flower
Packera aurea - golden ragwort
Peltandra virginica - arrow arum
Rhexia virginica - Virginia meadow-beauty
Solidago altissima, S. graminifolia, S. sempervirens - goldenrods
Verbena hastata - swamp verbena
Vernonia novaboracensis - New York ironweed

SWAMP (WET WOODS, SHADE):

Actaea racemosa - black bugbane
Arisaema triphyllum - jack in the pulpit
Chelone glabra - white turtlehead
Eupatorium dubium, E. purpureum - Joe pyeweed
Impatiens capensis, I. pallida - touch-me-knot, jewelweed
Peltandra virginica - arrow arum

FERNS FOR WET PLACES:

Athyrium felix-femina - lady fern
Matteuccia struthiopteris - ostrich fern
Onoclea sensibilis - sensitive fern
Osmunda cinnamomea - cinnamon fern
Osmunda claytoniana - interrupted fern
Osmunda regalis - royal fern
Woodwardia virginica - Virginia chain fern



RUSHES AND SEDGES FOR WET PLACES:

Carex stipata - awlfruit sedge
Carex stricta - tussock sedge
Juncus effusus - soft rush
Scirpus cyperinus - woolgrass
Scirpus pungens - common three-square
Sparganium americanum - burreed
Spartina pectinata - prairie cordgrass

SHRUBS FOR WET PLACES:

Alnus serrulata - smooth alder
Aronia arbutifolia - red chokeberry
Cephalanthus occidentalis - button bush
Clethra alnifolia - summersweet
Cornus amomum - silky dogwood, *C. stolonifera*
Ilex glabra - inkberry, *I. verticillata* - winterberry
Itea virginica - Virginia sweetspire
Lindera benzoin - spicebush
Rhododendron viscosum - swamp azalea
Rosa palustris - swamp rose
Sambucus canadensis - elderberry
Spiraea tomentosa - steeplebush, hardback
Viburnum dentatum - arrowwood viburnum, *V. nudum* - possomhaw viburnum

NATIVE TREES FOR WET PLACES:

Acer rubrum - red maple
Amelanchier canadensis - serviceberry
Betula nigra - river birch
Chamaecyparis thyoides - Atlantic white cedar
Fraxinus pensylvanica -green ash
Liquidambar styraciflua - sweet gum
Magnolia virginiana - sweetbay magnolia
Nyssa sylvatica - black gum
Platanus occidentalis - sycamore
Quercus bicolor - swamp white oak, *Q. palustris* - pin oak
Salix nigra - black willow
